CAWACO PROGRAMS

The following initiatives are conducted by Cawaco staff and supplement the mission of the Council:

RC&D Grows Gardens

Cawaco partners with other RC&D Councils, the Alabama Association of RC&D Councils and USDA/NRCS to provide vegetable seeds to schools, community gardens and veterans at no cost. Funds also provide mini-grants for garden-related expenses. The goal is to empower communities and schools to grow fresh local produce that can be shared, eaten, and even sold to generate income for their programs. The project also has the added benefit of exposing students to agricultural career opportunities. In the year 2022, twenty-five mini-grants were given to community and school garden all over the state, seeds were distributed to 64 gardens and calculated value of this statewide initiative totals \$257,339.00.

RC&D Builds Trails

In 2011, Cawaco received a grant from the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs to purchase and equip a trailer to assist groups in developing and maintaining recreational trails. Volunteers can borrow the trailer and its hand tools for trail building, garden improvement and invasive species removal. So far in 2022 the tools have been used by 255 volunteers, and have logged 134 volunteer hours, for a total value of \$40,526.80. These volunteers used the tools to clear over 44 acres of privet or other invasive species, and create or maintain over 34,000 feet of trail. The tools are currently being utilized by Alabama State Parks so these numbers will increase by the end of the fiscal year.

Community Support

Cawaco provides ongoing support for underserved urban communities in Jefferson County. Through numerous partnerships and networks, we assist neighborhoods, churches and community development needs through site visits, consultation and connections to resources including Cawaco grant programs. So far, support has been given to the following entities:

- Assisted Birmingham City Council District 8 Carol Clarke with proposal to form a
 Community Trust for neighborhoods in her district. Proposal was discussed with
 Mayor's office for approval of projects within confines of CARES recovery funding
 given to the city.
- Presented to **Birmingham City Council District 8 Carol Clarke** at the Neighborhood/Community Summit February 2022. Cawaco represented the 'Environmental Stewardship' programs in Birmingham with emphasis on urban tree planting.
- Coordination and assistance to **UAB Grand Challenge Live HealthSmart Challenge**. Advising UAB Sustainable Smart Cities program in community health and built environment interventions including transformation of vacant property and reforestation of city streets.

- Assisted Birmingham Sunrise Rotary, Titusville Community Development Corporation, and UAB Sustainable Cities with January Martin Luther King Day of Service with restoration of vacant lots and maintenance on North Titusville community garden and Triangle Community Park.
- Reviewed National Fish & Wildlife Foundation 5 Star Proposal from the City of Vestavia for stormwater flooding interventions in commercial and residential areas of Vestavia. Consultation included using green infrastructure for stormwater management.
- Assisted Birmingham neighborhood urban farm Fountain Heights Farms with expansion planning. Included mapping of available vacant lots for community garden expansion.
- Advised Black Cherry Tree Project on establishing neighborhood memorials through planting native black cherry trees. The Black Cherry Tree Project addresses racial reconciliation through the memorialization of the 33 African Americans who were lynched in Jefferson County between the mid to late 1800's and the mid 1900's. As part of The Black Cherry Tree Project, 33 commemorative black cherry tree saplings will be planted across Birmingham in publicly accessible locations in honor of each victim.
- Supported Birmingham Sunrise Rotary workday in North Titusville Neighborhood, Birmingham in April 2022. Volunteer activities Included vacant lot clean up and maintenance of community garden. Birmingham Sunrise Rotary Club is actively involved in the greening of Birmingham creation of green spaces, walking trails, and parks that serve the people of Birmingham.
- Advised **Mt Hebron Missionary Baptist Church** in ACIPCO/Findley Neighborhood in Birmingham with community garden planning on church owned property. The urban garden plan is part of their community health outreach.
